Explore Watchet

We've not one, but two fascinating museums, a station from where heritage steam trains depart regularly, a whole host of small, independent shops and cafes, inns, places to stay and a couple of excellent art galleries too.




If you'd like to know more about Watchet's long and colourful maritime traditions, search no further than the **Watchet Boat Museum** with its boats, models, artefacts and charts. And you'll find a huge amount of local history packed into the town's **Market House Museum** too. Look out for the near complete lchthyosaur; a marine creature that swum in the warm seas of Somerset millions of years ago.

Watchet's Jurassic and Triassic coastline is a real treasure trove for amateur **fossil hunters**. Ammonites and other fossils are often found on the easily accessible foreshore. Remember to hunt on a falling tide.

There are many walking routes which run through or near our town. Walkers can follow the Coleridge Trail, and perhaps recognise the inspiration behind the romantic poet's famous 'Rime of the Ancient Mariner'. Although the tracks are long gone The Old Mineral Line Railway, once used to bring iron ore from the Brendon Hills to the port, is another popular walk. The Watchet Heritage Trail leads you through the narrow winding streets to explore our town on foot.

By Road



Transporting over 5 million passengers since the line re-opened in 1976, the West Somerset Railway is a true country branch line of the old Great Western Railway. It offers a nostalgic ride back in time over 20 miles through the lovely West Somerset and Quantocks countryside and the perfect way to visit Watchet.
